Challenged Athletes Foundation	<p>Steps in where rehabilitation and health insurance end by providing funding grants for adaptive sports equipment such as sports wheelchairs, handcycles, mono skis and sports prosthetics, and resources for training and competition expenses directly to physically challenged individuals. Access for Athletes surmounts financial impediments to participation in sports, ensuring that challenged athletes are not left on the sidelines because they can't afford expensive equipment or training costs.</p> <p>Annual grants only available during the fall (September-November), usually September through October. Kelly Brush Foundation	<p>The Active Fund supports individuals with paralysis caused by a SCI who reside in the US for any piece of sports or recreation equipment designed for people with disabilities that allow the individual to be active.</p> <p>Two cycles per year - Spring and Fall.</p>
Go Hawk Eye Foundation	<p>The grant program is open to adaptive individuals and organizations in the United States and consists of adaptive sports equipment and sports experience grants.</p> <p>The grant cycle is biannual ending May 1 and November 1.</p>
Move United	<p>Survivor Adaptive Sports Fund provides funding for adaptive sports equipment along with other things for people with permanent physical disability who are victims of gun violence or acts of terrorism.</p>
Swift Outdoor Accessible Recreation	<p>Year-round grants for: Spinal cord injury survivors with paraplegia and quadriplegia caused by an accident, separate from complications at birth or due to stroke, ALS, Spina Bifida, Multiple Sclerosis etc. Grant eligible for wheelchair outdoor tires, wheelchair attachments, vehicle modifications, small home modifications, and anything that helps access the outdoors</p>

Victoria's Victory Foundation	Provides funding for personal needs of: recovery training sessions, in-home nursing services, mobility equipment, and home and vehicle modifications.
Be Perfect SCI Foundation	Year round grants available for individuals living with a SCI and varying neurological disorders for medical supplies, wheelchairs, smaller-scale home/car adaptations, high medical bills, and participation in activity based therapy programs
Spinal Cord Opportunities for Rehabilitation Endowment	SCORE is a non-profit organization that provides modest financial grants to people paralyzed while participating in sports or recreational activities. SCORE endeavors to improve the quality of life for people with spinal cord injury, assisting with the substantial out-of-pocket costs associated with obtaining the best medical care, home amenities, and transportation. The end goal is to facilitate rehabilitation and independent living.
Friends of Disabled Adults and Children (FODAC)	Our volunteers and partners allow FODAC to provide refurbished home medical equipment (HME) and services for adults and children with disabilities. Over the years, our model has remained the same: to collect new and gently used HME and provide it to those with the greatest need. Please search our site for all of our programs and information on ways to get involved.
I Got Legs Foundation	Any US resident individuals with a permanent physical disability requiring the use of mobility technology are eligible to apply. There is no age requirement. Applicants must demonstrate financial need and may be required to provide documentation. Given limited resources, special emphasis will be given to projects that concern mobility technology (e.g. robotic exoskeletons, prosthetics, adaptive technologies for homes/vehicles, etc.) Eligible items: wheelchairs, vehicle modifications (i.e., hand controls or lifts), small home modifications including bath, ramp, and lift installations, computers, bed/mattress, shower chairs and lifts.
Wheels of Happiness	WOH was created to support spinal cord injury survivors and people with motor disabilities in disadvantaged communities around the world and help people with disabilities become independent and reintegrate. WOH provides people with medical equipments, supplies, scholarships
Triumph Foundation	Triumph's Keep Moving Forward Grant is for people with spinal cord injury that have inadequate health insurance coverage and financial hardship to receive necessary equipment and services that will help them triumph over obstacles they face and enhance their quality of life. Bryon Reisch Paralysis Foundation	Charitable grants are reviewed quarterly in January, March, June, and September. Request should be for a specific item. National Organization for Vehicle Accessibility	<p>Organization that works to provide vehicle modification grants to individuals with disabilities throughout the United States and Canada in need of financial assistance. The National Organization for Vehicle Accessibility (NOVA) believes that every individual has the right to accessible transportation. NOVA's mission is to assist those with mobility needs through education, information and product acquisition. Applications are accepted at anytime and grants are awarded based on applications received on a quarterly basis.</p>
Bridge to Mobility	<p>Search for a National Mobility Equipment Dealer Association (NMEDA) dealer near you and request a meeting. Your dealer will work with you to perform a Needs Analysis. The dealer will assess what can be financed based on your income and credit. If there is a gap in funding, your dealer will submit a grant application to Bridge to Mobility directly on your behalf. Bryon Reisch Paralysis Foundation	<p>Scholarship grants: A \$1000 to \$4000 scholarship shall be awarded to two to three individuals with spinal cord injuries, spinal cord related disabilities, or the child of that person, for post high school education yearly (once a year).</p> <p>Priority going to direct spinal cord injuries and diseases resulting in paralysis such as spinal tumors, spinal strokes or aneurysms affecting the spinal cord, or spina bifida. The applicant must have a high school or college GPA of 2.5 or higher.</p>
Craig H Neilsen Foundation Scholarship	<p>The Neilsen Scholarship Program (NSP) provides scholarships at selected colleges, universities, and community colleges to create and maintain opportunities for students with spinal cord injury to pursue higher education and lead full lives in and out of the classroom. To reduce socioeconomic barriers to success, these scholarships cover tuition and fees for undergraduate or graduate studies and include supplemental financial support for eligible students.</p> <p>Applications for NSP are by invitation only. Swim with Mike	<p>Eligibility Requirements:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Have participated in organized athletics (high school, collegiate, or club) prior to illness or injury ➤ Have suffered an illness or injury resulting in a physical disability, which substantially limits daily activity (e.g. paralysis, blindness, cancer, amputation, or head injury) ➤ Meet the admission requirements of a four-year or graduate-level institution ➤ Make satisfactory progress towards your degree after college or graduate school acceptance ➤ Maintain a minimum of 2.5 GPA cumulative and be "in good academic standing" at your accredited school ➤ Demonstrate financial need

The Stroke Foundation	The Stroke Foundation empowers stroke survivors during their recovery and rehabilitation phase by providing grants for additional physical, occupational and speech therapy.
The Stroke Recovery Foundation	The Foundation has established the Stroke Victor Recovery Fund to pay partial scholarships for survivors who would benefit from additional speech, physical and occupational therapy but whose insurance reimbursements have been terminated, and the survivors do not have the financial resources to continue. Tyler Schrenk Foundation	<p>Track 1 for the AT for All Grant Pilot will provide you with \$1,000 for assistive technology devices and assistive technology support. Assistive technology support includes, your own AT trainer who will be your assistive technology guide, from helping you pick the right AT for you, providing remote installation support and remote training on the devices you receive. If you don't need these support options, see Track 2.</p> <p>Track 2 for the AT for All Grant Pilot will provide you with \$1,000 for assistive technology devices. This is a free program for people with physical disabilities such as limb amputation, stroke, SCI, traumatic brain injury, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, spina bifida ect.
The Ian Burkhart Foundation	The Ian Burkhart Foundation will help individuals seek out widely accessible funding sources and provide grants for items not usually covered by insurance however they will greatly increase independence and quality of life.
Getting Back Up	Provide qualified and selected individuals with funding for participation in exercise-based recovery programs and the purchase of adaptable products. These programs and products have been proven to greatly improve the physical and emotional well-being of the injured individual.
The MW Fund	MW Fund provides financial aid for specialized spinal cord injury (SCI) rehabilitation that is not covered by insurance.

Project 34	Project 34 assists with the purchasing of medical equipment and assistive devices that may not be otherwise accessible to a patient, as well as provides grants to individuals to afford physical therapy for optimal function.
Walking with Anthony	Walking with Anthony covers the cost of essential rehabilitation therapy so that people suffering from an SCI can face the enormous challenge of physical recovery with freedom from the relentless financial weight of paying for rehab. They are also expanding rehab centers to ensure all who can benefit from dedicated facilities and communities for SCI rehab have access to them.

Mississippi Paralysis Association	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Quality of Life Grants - Financial assistance for purchasing adaptive and durable medical equipment (DME), medical supplies (on a limited basis), and home/vehicle modifications that will allow them to live as independently as possible and improve their quality of life. 2. MPA Peer Support Program - Provides peer support to individuals living with paralysis and their family members. 3. MPA Sports Grants - MPA offers individual sport sponsorships to qualified individuals and a \$5,000 team sponsorship to organized non-profit wheelchair teams. 4. Road Runner Sports	Adaptive bicycling grants for children 18 and under who have a permanent physical disability or severe mobility impairment.

The Morgan Project	Morgan's Legacy Gift offers families the opportunity to apply for the "tools" that make their job of caring for their child easier and enhance quality of life for the child and family at the same time. Examples of items previously funded: bath chairs, car seats, lightweight portable adaptive strollers, positional seating devices, switch activated toys, vestibular stimulation, and similar items. We have also offered a limited number of families with financial assistance to help offset the cost to attend disease-specific medical support group conferences.
